From Pastor John...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

“As God’s chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful.” (Colossians 3:12-15)

The Apostle Paul’s words to community of Colossae have been chosen by the Church Council as the basis for a Church Covenant, and by extension, our community of faith at Good Shepherd in Concord. This passage calls us to a way of life together that is both challenging and difficult: as human beings we often fall short of such ideal Christian living. It is also renewing and hopeful: in Christ’s peace, and by our choosing, we can live together as God’s holy people with joy and thanksgiving!

If the above two paragraphs look familiar, you’re right – that’s the way I began my written Annual Report as found in the bulletin of reports for our Annual Congregational Meeting January 29. I, like many of you, was sad and very concerned about the way the Annual Meeting transpired last Sunday. Sometimes in human organizations and gatherings of people, our emotions and reactions get in the way of our intentions. Often we as people do fall short, yet God continues to call us to a higher standard of interaction and love, working together to build up the Body of Christ.

My focus/vision for us at Good Shepherd has always been to create an atmosphere of welcome, hospitality, and joy, celebrating God’s love in Jesus. I know we can be that team of people working together in love and service, working, planning, deciding together, listening respectfully, allowing for differences of opinion, yet respecting the person. When we do that, we’ll be that team of joy, energy, excitement and faith, having fun being God’s people of love and service.

Looking ahead

Soon the lighted star on top of our chimney at home will be unplugged. It’s been lit continuously since before Christmas and even throughout my vacation, as a reminder that God’s love and grace is revealed and shines through Jesus, the Light for all. In February, the season of Epiphany moves to the ashes, dust of Lent, where we see the love of God in Jesus coming to be the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world – and our sin too.

We look forward to some outstanding musical leadership and teaching, and the celebration of God through our music in worship as Margaret Halbig and Phoebe (Jevtovic) Rosquist have been installed and lead us as Instrumental Music Director and Choir Director. Together with Tom Deans-Flegel, we can sing praises and make music to the glory of God. Now is a great time to join the Bell Choir and/or the Sanctuary Choir. You’ll learn a lot about music and singing, and your heart will soar to new heights of praise!

Another area I’ve been discussing is the impact of technology on Christian life, for individuals, families, and congregations. This topic is being explored by The Lutheran Alliance for Faith, Science and Technology. It was addressed at a recent convocation at Luther Seminary, and was the subject of a Yale Divinity School article written by Rachel Hatch (granddaughter-in-law of our own members Ray and Helen Ollila). We each make decisions about the place, purpose, timing, and use of technology in our lives. Technology can of course be a Good Servant, or a Bad Master. As a Bad Master, technology can drive us through fear of missing out, and thus control our choices and our lives. As a Good Servant, technology can be a powerful, effective gift to enhance our lives, our communication, and our sharing of God’s love in Christ. We have opportunities for ministry and outreach in helping people to use their technology, keep themselves and their families safe from the risks it brings, and make healthy choices that keep technology in its place as a Good Servant.

From Our Council President

As Council President, I write to you with heaviness on my heart and mind. As I reflect on our Annual Meeting, and this past year as a Council Member, I realize that much was not evident to you, as members of the congregation, as it was to the Council regarding the operations of our church.

Here is what I want you to know, to believe, and to trust. Everything is going to be ok. favorite passages: 1 Corinthians 13: 4-8- which says "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. ⁵ It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. ⁶ Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. ⁷ It always protects, **always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres."** In making these practices part of your daily routine, you may find positive changes in your own life.

We as a Council have come to realize that it is essential that the communications must flow in both directions, both from Council to the Congregation and the Congregation to the Council, in order to eliminate feelings of non transparency. To start this process of communication, beginning in March you will see monthly Council Meeting highlights in the church newsletter and minutes from the monthly meetings will be available in the narthex for your review.

And lastly I say to you, we need to stay together and rejoice to the Lord.

Everything is going to be ok.

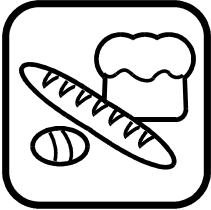
