From Pastor John...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Grace and peace to you all as we move full steam into September and fall activities! I hope we still have many warm days left as we celebrate these days. By **the time you read this, we'll have more idea about our congregation's focus and plans for an associate pastor for youth and family ministry. We'll be full swing into preparing for the visit of Dr. Mark Allan Powell on September 17-18. We'll be looking ahead to the beginning of a Christian Education time between our services beginning on September 25. For more mature members—note the re-organization/renewal of "Leisure Lunch" on September 27! Finally, we'll be engaged in our fall stewardship program which concludes in October, considering again God's gifts to us individually (our God given talents [read passions]), and how God is calling us to share those passions with others throughout the year.**

All of this life and activity begins with relationships. **Church is about relationship. A book I've been reading (*Unbinding the Gospel*, by Martha Grace Reese) talks about this in a chapter called Real Life. God chooses to work in and through real, authentic, healthy relationships with God, relationships between church members, and relationships with people outside the church. Each set of relationships are important, distinct, and constantly interact with and affect each other.**

First, foremost, and foundational, is relationship with God – taking time to be with God – quiet, loud, reflective, active, alone, praying, being attentive to **God's Spirit, reading scripture, reflecting on God's word, asking questions (yes, we're encouraged to practice many ways of being in relationship).** Reese writes how everything in life (inside and outside the congregation) depends on pastors and congregations

having a primary focus on having a relationship with God.

A relationship with God – this is of course, a lot easier said than done. Yet I know that when I take **time to read, reflect, pray, ask questions, God's Spirit** brings a great sense of peace, order, energy, hope. **The questions aren't always easy, and answers even more challenging. (I'm always suspicious of those who say "God told me to do" this or that). Healthy time alone with God leads to healthy relationships in churches.**

Reese goes on to explain these healthy relationships (pg. 64):

People are real. They are honest. They share their lives with each other in significant ways rather than putting on a "perfection show."

People see each other for who they are, and show respect by telling the truth lovingly.

Relationships are not sentimental. People acknowledge their own frailties and sinfulness. They may have disagreements, but they find ways of resolving them without undue conflict or long resentments.

Visitors can feel it when they walk in the door!

How's that – visitors can feel it! As we begin some fall programming, I invite you to celebrate worship, be a part of the Christian Education time (volunteer to help with children/youth, attend adult discussions on the Bible, faith topics). **Choosing to grow, and being open to God's Spirit, we will feel alive, and be in touch with joy!**

Take note of (and take part in) activities **announced in other parts of this newsletter! God's blessings to you – see you in church!**

From Our Council President...

Our life experience creates stories that we can tell to our children, family, and friends. This month I want to share with you two stories that came from Vacation Bible Camp. Why? Because these stories created a new found meaning that is found in the Bible. If you go to John 21:1-19, you will find Jesus talking to Simon Peter. Jesus asked Simon, **“Do you love me?” Three times Simon replied, “You know I do” and three times Jesus said, “Take care of my sheep.”** The profound experience gained from Vacation Bible Camp created a new and different understanding about what it means to take care of the sheep for Jesus. The volunteers **knew the theme was “grow in faith, have fun, change the world.” Never once did I think that would mean I would grow if faith, have fun, and change the world. But that is what happened.**

Good Shepherd had 22 children who attended. Out of the 22 we had five children who were children, grandchildren or great grandchildren of members from our congregation. What about the other 19 children? Who were they? They were children from other churches in the our community like Saint Matthew, Saint Bonaventure, and Calvary Temple. Do I think we will see these families come to our church? **Who knows, and that isn't the question** needing to be asked or answered. Nor is the question why did the parent bring the child to Vacation Bible Camp at Good Shepherd.

What does matter is Laura Mott volunteered to lead us through a structured process where any child that came could **“grow in faith, have fun, and change the world.” From the time the thought that we should and could have a Vacation Bible Camp to the very end we all knew “God was with us” and it was going to be a wonderful experience for the children. What I didn't know was it was going to be a wonderful experience for the volunteers also. Thanks Be**

to God who continues to amaze and surprise me every day. Every day the children were excited to be there. They listened to the adults and followed along, they loved the crafts, the storytelling, the gardening, and the games. The children found wonderment in what Bob was going to provide each day for a snack. On the second day, Bob ground up graham crackers, this was sub-soil. He made chocolate pudding that went on top of the graham crackers and called this dirt. Next he ground up Oreo Cookies and this was the topsoil, on top of the chocolate pudding. Last, was a gummy worm or two that went on the **very top. He explained, “the gummy worms were to fertilize dirt and to keep the dirt loose.” The children and the adults loved the lesson on why things grow and the snack was delicious. Thank you Bob Ripley for a job well done for the entire week!**

One four-year-old boy grew from being a baby to a child. This story you will have to ask Ken Robinson or Creighton Mitchell to learn what happened. It is a funny story! I am not sure it should be in print in the church newsletter. It was wonderful to have male role models every day during the week. Thanks to Ken and Creighton. You are the best!

So, what is the message here you ask? Jesus asked Simon to take care of the sheep. I think this is the message about Vacation Bible Camp. We took all of the children who came and we played, we learned, we grew together, **and it didn't matter that they weren't** members of our church. What mattered was they were safe and cared for. All of us were learning about Jesus, having fun, and making new **friends, adults included. It doesn't get any** better than this here on earth, right? Thanks to everyone, and I mean everyone who made it happen. We should be happy, excited, and know we, too, are like Simon Peter and taking care of His sheep.

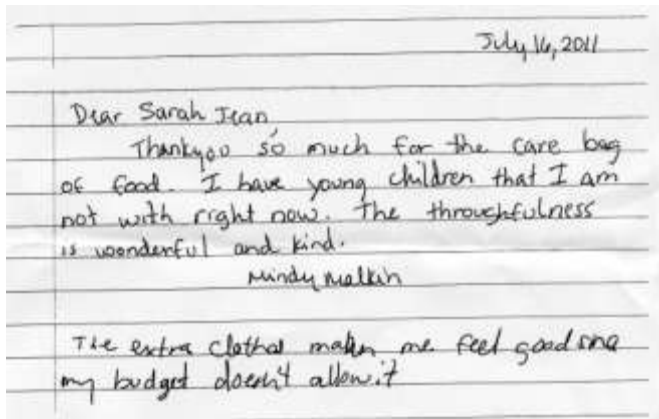

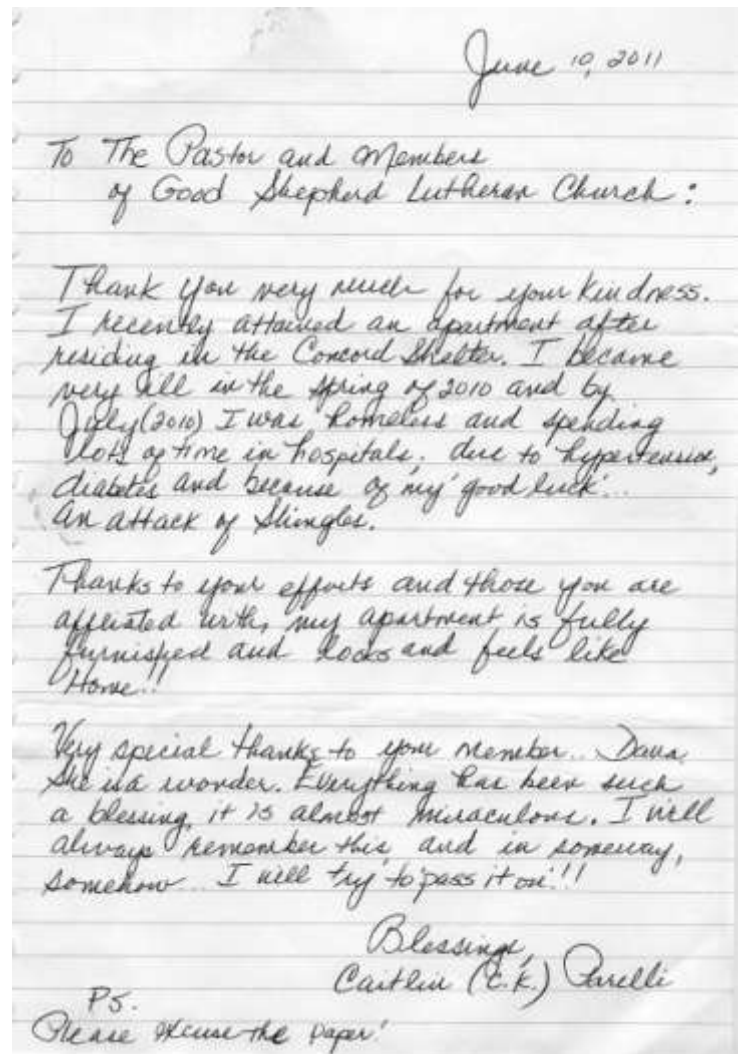

**Good Shepherd Endowment Fund**

For some years now, Good Shepherd has had an Endowment Fund, however we have not been actively promoting it. An Endowment Fund policy has now been established.

The purpose of this fund is to provide financial support for the mission of Good Shepherd. Earnings from the fund are to be used only to support religious, charitable, and educational activities and not as part of the regular operating budget of the church. It could be used also to assist with specific capital expenditures and equipment for the church.

As of December 31, 2010 the fund showed a total of just over \$16,000. The intention is to grow this fund until such time as the interest earned is a meaningful amount.

Besides cash contributions to the fund, other contributions might include real estate or personal property, investments such as stocks and bonds or insurance that name Good Shepherd as the beneficiary. In the coming months, we will arrange for a speaker to address some of these options and answer any questions you may have.

Social Ministry Embarks on a New Endeavor Leading Up to our
“Blessing of the Animals” on Sunday, October 2, 2011

Did you know that Tony LaRussa’s ARF Program helps low income families care for their pets?

ARF's FoodShare program was born in 1996 when several food manufacturers offered ARF discontinued or overstocked canned and dry food. This food was distributed to Meals on Wheels clients and local feral cat groups. As of 2002, pet food generously donated by Safeway Inc. has been distributed on a regular basis to low income residents and responsible feral guardians of Contra Costa County, California who have spayed and neutered their animals. The challenges faced by FoodShare clients and Contra Costa County residents in general have increased due to the worsening economic climate. With high foreclosure and unemployment rates, the need for ARF's FoodShare program has never been greater.



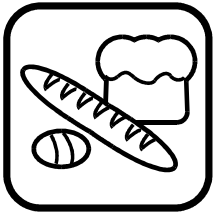
